



# NRP Quarterly Updates

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## Planning Commission's Digital Platform launched for risk-informed development

Programming Division of the Bangladesh Planning Commission has launched a web-based platform with the support of National Resilience Programme to integrate disaster risk information into development planning and budgeting, policies, and programs. Hon'ble Planning Minister Mr. M A Mannan inaugurated the Digital Risk Information Platform (DRIP) in a launching ceremony held on February 02 at the NEC conference room. Later the platform was renamed as Disaster and Climate Risk Information Platform (DRIP).



“Strengthening Risk Governance and

Institutionalization of resilience is a global and as well as a national commitment of the Government of Bangladesh,” the minister said in his inaugural address. Apart from this, The launching ceremony was addressed by Mr. Dr. Shamsul Alam, State Minister for Ministry of Planning,

Sudipto Mukerjee, Resident Representative of UNDP, Christine Johnsson, Deputy Head of Mission in the Embassy of Sweden, Nick Harvey, Senior Humanitarian Adviser, Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO), Arif Abdullah Khan, Program Analyst of UNDP and Dr. Nurun Nahar, Project Director of NRP in Programming Division. Also, Mr. Pradip Ranjan Chakraborty, Secretary of, Planning Division presided over the session. He pointed out that the commission has introduced Disaster Impact Assessment (DIA) in the feasibility study format and the inclusion of DIA in development project

formulation is under process which will be placed in the next meeting of the National Economic Council (NEC). More than a hundred representatives from Government agencies, diplomatic missions, and scientific organizations were present in the event and joined virtually.

## 12<sup>th</sup> Meetings of NRP's Joint Programme Implementation Committee (JPIC)

The 12th meeting of the Joint Programme Implementation Committee ( JPIC)for the National Resilience Programme (NRP) was held on January 19, 2022, Wednesday; at 3.30 pm using the Virtual platform. Mr. Ranjit Kumar Sen ndc, Additional Secretary, Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief (MoDMR) and National Programme Coordinator (NPC) of NRP chaired the meeting. This meeting reviewed the last quarter of 2021 activities of NRP's four subprojects and discussed other important issues including joint programme evaluation, new NRP formulation etc.



Mr. Mohammad Iftekhar Hossain, Programme Coordinator (PC), NRP presented an overview of the NRP project Intervention. All the subproject's Project Directors also

shared their quarterly progress in this meeting. The chair expressed his concern about the existing pandemic situation and requested everyone to follow the Covid-19 protocols.

# Contribution Towards Resilience

## Draft Policy Brief on Disability-inclusive Disaster Risk Reduction

To strengthen the capacity of GoB, Non GoB agencies for ensuring effective participation of persons with disabilities in the DRR process, including the early warning system, the NRP DDM part produced a policy brief on Disability-inclusive Disaster Risk Reduction. The policy brief recommended that the Govt. and non-govt. service providing authority should work aligned with the Self-help Group (SHG) of Persons with Disabilities and Organization of Persons with Disabilities (OPD) and need sponsorship support to the Organization of Persons with Disabilities, improve capacity on disability

inclusion for service providing authority as well as Service providing centers and educational institutions to be ensured/transformed as disability accessible. An early warning message should be developed and disseminated considering persons with disability. Policy should be reviewed so that persons with disabilities to be entitled to get emergency support during disaster if they are enlisted to any other safety-net support. According to SoD disability inclusion have to be ensured all stages.

## Policy Brief on Disaster Risk Reduction Inclusive Social Safety Net (DRRiSSN)

The study and piloting results found that GoB Safety net programmes, while supporting employment generation and food security for the poorest, have not always been planned in reducing vulnerability to disaster shocks. For this instance, NRP DDM part piloting DRRiSSN for improving community resilience by creating replicable, cost-effective models for local disaster risk reduction and risk management, and institutionalizing models. One area of focus was on developing a model to leverage existing social safety nets for DRR, such as EGPP of the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief. This policy brief has key message as follows, Revision of the EGPP guideline is

required for reconciliation of daily wages of EGPP with existing other safety net programme of MoDMR, Develop comprehensive participatory selection process for identifying appropriate participants for safety net programme, and maintain a central database, Need-based fund allocation should be made based on the number of vulnerable beneficiaries an estimated loss and damage by the disaster in respective UPs or Upazila Parishad. Allocation of non-wages budget under EGPP has an important role for enhancing resilience of community climate induced disaster by construction of different resilient infrastructure.

## Policy brief and Infographic on Impact of COVID-19 and Disasters on women in Bangladesh

Bangladesh is ranked 65th (out of 156 countries) in the World Economic Forum's (WEF) Gender Gap Index 2021 (World Economic Forum, 2021). Bangladesh's achievement also comes against the backdrop of several natural disasters in 2020. While the Gender Gap Index provides a positive picture for Bangladesh, it does not necessarily explain the lag due to COVID-19 and the recent disasters. The Department of Women's Affairs (DWA), Ministry Women's and Children's Affairs Bangladesh, as an implementing partner of the National Resilience Programme (NRP), commissioned a mixed-method study to address this knowledge gap. The study titled 'Gender Analysis of COVID-19 and recent natural disasters in Bangladesh' was undertaken to understand the impact of the pandemic and natural disasters on women and vulnerable groups which includes - adolescent girls, married women, marginalized women, married women from low-income

households, sex workers and the transgenders. Data was also collected from men and boys in the communities for a comparative analysis. This policy brief and infographic builds on both secondary literature and primary findings of the study.

These provide a thorough insight into the impact of pandemic and natural disasters

- (i) unpaid care work
- (ii) women's livelihood, income and food security
- (iii) women's leadership and decision-making authority
- (iv) mobility
- (v) gender-based violence
- (vi) access to health services
- (vii) WASH and
- (viii) access to education.

The policy brief highlights emerging issues and provides a policy framework to mitigate these challenges and keep Bangladesh on track in achieving its targets related to



women's empowerment. Policy brief and infographics based on key findings are in the process of printing which will be disseminated in Q2.

# Innovation in Resilience Discourse

## BEZA to introduce Business Continuity Plan in Economic Zones

As part of promoting resilience in business sector, Programming Division-the implementing agency of NRP-PD Part is supporting Bangladesh Economic Zones Authority (BEZA) for developing and piloting of BCP guidelines in selected economic zones. Based on the learning and experience from this piloting initiative, the BEZA will institutionalize BCP in its operational manual. In this connection a MoU was signed between BEZA and Programming Division on 21 December 2021 and later, the BEZA formed a technical committee to guide the consultant team. UNDP as technical partner of NRP engaged 6 consultants for this assignment. The BCP will contribute to minimize the losses due to disasters in economic zones. Initially the BCP will be piloted in Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Shilpanagar, Mirshari, Chattogram and Meghna Industrial Economic Zones in Narayanganj. By this time. The consultant team has

visited two economic zones and captured risk scenarios followed by a stakeholders workshop in Chattogram Circuit House with Deputy Commissioner, Chattogram in the chair. The BCP technical committee meeting on 14 December and 10 May reviewed the inception plan and other progress.

BCP is a new area of work for NRP, as earlier there is no remarkable initiative on this, though there is some BCP experience in financial sectors particularly, the Bangladesh Bank is maintaining BCP for its financial protection. NRP has mandate to enhance knowledge level on resilient business to the business community and the investors. A study on supply chain resilience has been conducted in association with BGMEA and supply chain training manual developed for business administrators and investors

## Gender Marker tool kit for LGED

There is strong evidence that gender-sensitive infrastructure pays long-term dividends for advancing gender equality and empowering women. The needs and priorities of women, men, and other gender groups are different and infrastructural planning and investments must pay specific attention to consider this as a prime priority. In this context, Department of Women Affairs (DWA) part of NRP has led in developing of Gender Marker Toolkit for the Bangladesh Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) with technical support from UN Women and UNOPS.

This toolkit is being developed under Gender Mainstreaming Plan of National Resilience Programme to strengthen and

develop the gender work of LGED which already has a Gender Equity Strategy and Action Plan and an active Gender Forum. It is also a pride moment for National Resilience Programme to produce this important Gender Marker Toolkit which is first time in history when any government agency is going to adopt such marker for assessing gender responsiveness.

This Gender Marker Toolkit has been designed to strengthen and develop the gender work of LGED with aims to raise awareness, understanding and skills in ensuring gender responsiveness throughout all project stages and for all asset types. The Toolkit takes the user through 4 Project Stages and 5 sets of Major Indicators supported by over 90 Key Indicators (KIs) in question form.





# Initiatives for Enhancing Capacity

## Basic Course on Asset Management Gains Traction As Engineers From All Across the Country Join



Bringing in new ideas is challenging. However, getting the idea across to the right audience and gaining enough traction to keep the momentum going is always the bigger challenge. The NRP-LGED part realised this from the beginning and orchestrated a thorough capacity-building program for all of its interventions. The idea is to build a pool of qualified professionals, who will work as a community, with ownership of the Asset Management Systems. The Local Government Engineering Department

(LGED) was the pioneer in adopting the concepts of AM but they cannot work in isolation. And as a result, the NRP-LGED subproject has welcomed participants from all across the country and the invitation was well received. The 5-Day Residential Basic Course on Asset Management has been rolling since last year and in this quarter alone, **89 participants** received the training in **4 batches**, coming from LGED, DPHE, PWD, DDM, BWDB and LGIs.

## International Women's Day Special for NRP - LGED Part

For International Women's Day 2022 on March 8th, NRP LGED part had a brief conversation with Ms. Nayeema Nazneem Naz, Project Director, Greater Pabna and Bogura District Rural Infrastructure Development Project, Local Government Engineering Department - an inspirational leader whose work on climate action and mitigation speaks volumes. The LGED UNOPS component of the programme aims to improve the capacity of government through gender-responsive and risk-informed infrastructure and strengthen the management of infrastructure management assets. # Programme Activities (January – March 2022)

## 1. 7<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the NRP PD Part Project Steering Committee (PSC)



7th meeting of the Project Steering Committee (PSC) for NRP-Programming Division Part was held on 28 February 2022 with Mr. Prodip Ranjan Chakraborty, Secretary, and Planning Division in the chair. The meeting expressed satisfaction over the progress of the project activities and based on the feedback from stakeholders, the PSC suggested renaming of DRIP as Disaster and Climate Risk

Information Platform (DRIP) and emphasized training and orientation on DRIP for GoB officials. The meeting suggested submitting an exit plan and sustainability options for this software in the next PSC meeting. The meeting also suggested organizing the training related to DIA and DRIP with public sector training institutes.

## 2. 8<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the NRP DWA Part Programme Implementation Committee (PIC)

The 8th Project Implementation Committee (PIC) meeting of the National Resilience Programme (DWA Part) was held on 03 March 2022 Thursday at 12:00 PM. The meeting was presided over by Ms. Farida Pervin, Director General of the Directorate of Women Affairs. Representative members from different Ministries including Ms. Monoara Ishrat, Project Director were present at the meeting. The Committee was informed about the

progress of the project which includes project end-line survey, preparation of a storybook, video documentary, etc. The Committee also discussed the administrative approval of the Policy Brief on "Gender Responsive Guideline for Design and Review of Development Projects 2009". It was decided to organize a review workshop on the Policy Brief on Mainstreaming Gender into Development Project Development to get MoWCA's clearance.

## 3. Organized inception workshop on Business Continuity Plan (BCP) for Economic Zone

The inception workshop was chaired by Mohammad Erfan Sharif, Executive Member, and BEZA. Nasima Begum, Member, Socio-Economic Infrastructure Division of Bangladesh Planning Commission addressed in the workshop as Chief Guest. Among others, Khandker Ahsan Hossain, Chief of Programming Division,





Dr. Nurun Nahar, Joint Chief and Project Director, NRP, and Sudipto Mukerjee, Resident Representative, UNDP Bangladesh spoke in the workshop.

In her address, Nasima Begum emphasized on stakeholder engagement and a sense of ownership in the implementation of BCP. Sudipto Mukerjee underscored the need for

accuracy of data in risk analysis and suggested socialization of BCP. The chair of the session Mohammad Erfan Sharif called for consideration of fourth industrial revolution related issues in formulating development plans. A total of 50 representatives from different Government ministries, divisions and business associations participated in this event.

#### 4. Orientation on DRIP to SEID officials

The NRP-PD part Project organized orientation session on Disaster and Climate Risk Information Platform (DRIP) on 13 March 2022 for the officials of Socio-Economic Infrastructure Division of Bangladesh Planning Commission. Ms. Sharifa Khan, Member of SEID chaired the session. This event held on Programming Division Conference room. A total of 25 officers from this division participated. Dr. Nurun Nahar, Project Director for NRP-PD and Muhamad Jahedul Huq, Planning Specialist facilitated the session.



#### 5. Result Sharing Seminar on Earthquake and Flood Preparedness Programme



NRP DDM Part organized a result-sharing seminar Earthquake and Flood Preparedness Programme for building risk informed development and gender responsive disaster risk reduction and resilience in Bangladesh on 27 March 2022 (Sunday evening ), at CIRDAP International Conference Centre (1st Floor), Dhaka. During the result sharing session, most of the audience actively participate and the presenter translates the Dynamic Flood Risk Model (DFRM) and the meaning of raising the water level of rivers during monsoon in Bangladesh in terms of vulnerability to reduce loss and damage.

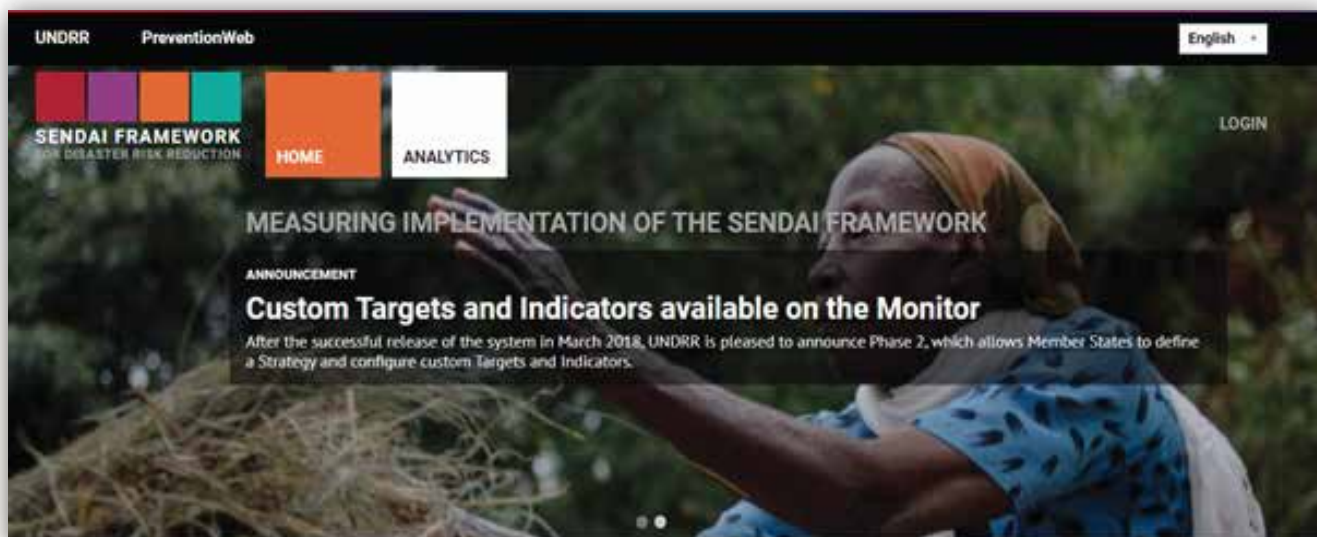
Also, the implementation partner claimed 80% accuracy of DFRM after piloting in the result-sharing workshop. Chief Guest Mr. Md Kamrul Hasan ndc, Secretary of Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief (MoDMR); Chairperson Mr. Md. Atiqul Huq, Director General, Department of Disaster Management (DDM) & Special Guest from Development Part Ms. Nayoka Martinez Bäckström, First Secretary, Environment & Climate Change, Development Cooperation Section, Government of Sweden and Mr. Prasenjit Chakma, Assistant Resident Representative, Resilience & Inclusive Growth Cluster, UNDP joined this result sharing seminar and highlights the disaster context of Bangladesh and the NRP DDM part contribution towards building resilience nation.



## 6. Mid Term review preparation for SFDRR implementation, NRP DDM Part

Recognizing that the period to 2023 marks the midpoint in implementing the Sendai Framework, as well as other related agreements, conventions and agendas, a midterm review (MTR) will take place in 2022. The MTR SF aim to assess progress on integrating disaster risk reduction into

policies, programmes and investments at all levels, identify good practice, gaps and challenges of the implementation of the Sendai Framework. Following UNDRR guidance the NRP DDM part is supporting MoDMR to prepare the road map to conduct the participatory review and reporting.



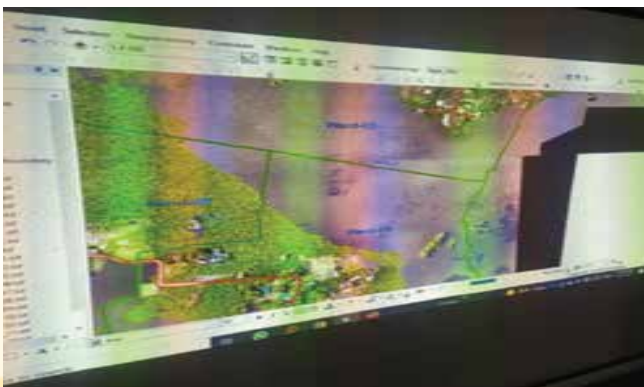
In addition to that, NRP DDM part provided technical support through participating in the technical committee through number of consultation meetings. Moreover,

provided assistance to MoDMR for reporting SFDRR targets A & B as per the milestone of reporting by 31st March 2022

## 7. Land use plan debriefing at Sunamganj Paurashova

Risk Sensitive Land Use Plan for Sunamganj is being prepared for Sunamganj Pourashava. It is one of the fast-growing medium scale urban centers in the north-eastern part of the country having high level of earthquake vulnerability considering the past- history and its location around the Dauki fault along with development trend. The Earthquake Sensitive Land Use Plan is a multi-hazard-based plan which includes earthquake, flash

flood, fire hazard, waterlogging risk zoning for Sunamganj Pourashava. Population and the land uses has been projected before the proposed plan for the period of 2041. Major focus of this plan is providing an outline for land use policy guidance which consider the high risk of earthquake, flash flood and other hazard. Guideline on different land use categories has been provided to mitigate the earthquake as well as flood and fire hazard risk.



It will presumably offer an opportunity to incorporate risk reduction into development and spatial plans. Moreover, the land use planning process will help the city to address

its need to reduce disaster risks as part of its pursuit for sustainable development.



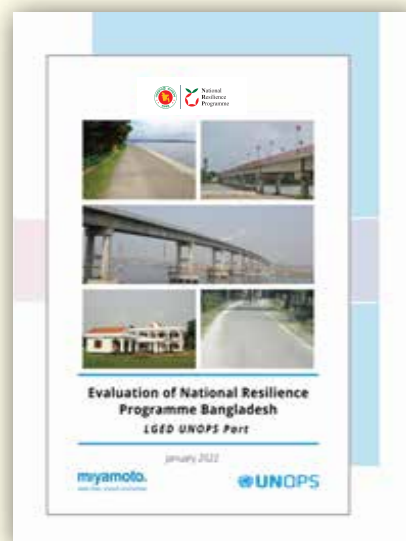
## 8. NRP LGED Subproject Completes Independent Evaluation by Miyamoto International Inc.

The NRP-LGED subproject has undergone an independent evaluation by Miyamoto International, Inc. (Miyamoto); which is a global multi-hazard engineering and disaster-risk reduction Firm. The evaluation was completed on January 2022.

Overall, the evaluation found it evident that the Asset Management approach, one of the key outcomes of the sub-project, will result in the design and construction of better and more resilient infrastructure.

On a technical level, the evaluation remarked that the proposed AM approach closely follows international best practices that, once implemented, will result in infrastructure that has longer service life, meets user demands, and is resilient when subjected to stress from natural disasters.

And at the organisational level, the proposed approach will result in a paradigm shift towards an outcome-based approach encompassing professional development for LGED staff, the streamlining of interagency development plans, and a more inclusive, gender-neutral work environment and a workforce that is representative of the population at large.



## 9. NRP DWA Subproject completes end line survey

NRP DWA Subproject commissioned Consiglieri Private Limited to conduct an independent intervention assessment to assess i) how successful the NRP DWA initiative has been in terms of mainstreaming gender in disaster management and disaster risk reduction and ii) the progress of the intervention (and its activities) against the targets that had been set at the beginning of the programme. The end-line study covered all aspects of the subproject's work: at a policy level,

institutional level, and field level. While highlighting the key results achieved by the subproject the survey reports the endline survey made very comprehensive recommendations for future programme e.g. widening and deepening engagement of other subprojects for effective gender mainstreaming, leveraging public-private partnership, institutionalizing training programmes, reinforcing efforts on SADDD, investing more on promoting women leadership, etc.



## 10. Humanitarian -Development Nexus : GiHA plays a critical role

GiHA WG provided technical support to Food Security Cluster in developing of Gender TIPP Sheet through consultation with cluster members. The final Gender TIPP Sheet is now ready and available on the FSC website to guide cluster members to check its readiness for gender responsiveness, identify gaps, and support taking required actions. HCTT Nexus Strategy now has a greater gender focus with support from GiHA WG chaired by DG, DWA. GiHA WG facilitated discussion around Integration of Gender Responsiveness, inclusion, and protection jointly with GBV and Protection Cluster and provided gender inputs in the Nexus action plan. The discussion to integrate Gender Responsiveness to Health, WASH is going on.

### Story Book: From where I stand

The story Book **"From where I stand"** demonstrating the impacts of the National Resilience Programme DWA's part in the lives of women and girls



has been finalized. The storybook captures the resilience and transformation of disaster vulnerable women as well as the exemplary efforts made by CPP, FPP and Urban volunteers, Disaster Management Committee Members, women led CSOs, and journalists to enhance the resilience of their locality. These stories will tell how NRP DWA contributed to the changes.



## Success Story

### Story 01 Disability Inclusive and Flood Resilient Model House

Sree Shayan Chandra Das (14) Son of Bandul Das, lives in plainland under Ramna Union, Chilmari, Kurigram. His father is a fisherman who fishes in the Brahmaputra River on a seasonal basis and rest of the time works as day labor. But his income is sufficient for maintaining his family. Shayan was born with disabilities, especially not moving without a wheelchair. In the rural setting, low-income family unable to construct accessible housing for such disabilities. During flood time he can't move from his house because of the mud. With the help of The NRP DDM part, Shayan's family constructed a flood resilient and disability-inclusive model house under the activities on Disability Inclusive DRR at Chilmari Upazila of Kurigram district.

His father emotionally quoted; *"I can't believe ever that I will get a flood resilient model house permanently where my elder son (Shayon Chandra Das-CP) could move around in the house by wheelchair"*.



Through this project, he is now able to move freely. Following this model house, Malteser International (German) replicated another project in Kurigram, the HOIFA Project built more than 18 flood resilient model houses (disabled accessible houses) for Disability people.
